

#### **Acknowledgement of Country**

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As we look back on 2023, it is evident that Carine Senior High School has continued its tradition of striving for excellence, not only in academic outcomes but in all aspects of our students' development and wellbeing. During 2023, we have achieved positive impacts across many of our school priorities, affirming our commitment to high-quality education and holistic development.

Academic Excellence: Our senior students have again performed well with 99% Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) achievement. Our median ATAR has consistently remained high over the past 9 years with a median ATAR of 86.65, a testament to our dedicated teaching staff and rigorous academic programs. We celebrated state-topping performances from students in Geography and saw a record number of students successfully complete Certificate IV qualifications, further diversifying the pathways available to our students. Looking ahead, we are well placed to ensure student achievement against the Department's new metrics beginning in 2025.

Holistic Development: We have maintained a focus on developing well-rounded, resilient lifelong learners. Our targeted initiatives, such as Mega-Life Week and various extracurricular activities and camps, ensure students have opportunities to grow both academically and personally. These programs are crucial in fostering an inclusive and supportive school environment. Connected to priority 3, please read about our work in this area from page 10.

**Teaching and Learning:** We continue to innovate in our teaching practices, ensuring they remain relevant and engaging. The expansion of our Classroom Management and Instructional Strategies for Engagement has been particularly impactful, enhancing the learning experience of all students. Review and integration have started on our Quality Teaching Strategy alongside development of our cultural awareness, understandings and safety with informative professional learning held. Our focus continues into 2024 so we are equipped to provide engaging, thoughtful and meaningful learning outcomes. Connected to priority 5 on page 19, further details are outlined relating to this.

**Wellbeing Focus:** The wellbeing of our community remains a priority. We have enhanced our student and staff support systems, providing a nurturing environment conducive to learning and personal growth. Initiatives such as our wellness therapy dogs and strategic event calendar have been instrumental in enriching our supportive atmosphere with relationships continuing to be a key focus for us. Please read about our initiatives in priority 1 and 3.

**Innovative Infrastructure:** The opening of our new \$32 million facility has been a milestone, enhancing our environment through providing state-of-the-art learning spaces. This significant investment in our infrastructure supports a broad range of learning activities and caters to the diverse needs of our student body, see priority 2, page 8 for more on this.

The year 2023 has solidified our foundation for future growth, with strategic planning and continuous improvement at the core of our endeavours as we look to our new Business Plan cycle. We are committed to upholding our high standards and adapting to meet the evolving needs of our students and the wider community with varied pathways and a focus on meeting students at their point of need.

As we move forward, we will continue to strive for excellence in providing the highest quality learning opportunities, ensuring that Carine Senior High School remains a high performing public school of excellence and innovation within the community. ## **Progress On Priorities:**

# 1. Focus on the wellbeing of staff and students, cultivating a sense of belonging and encouraging positive mental health.

Student and staff wellbeing has become a major focus for effective schools over the past few years. At Carine we have witnessed an increase in the number of students who have benefitted from additional supports and adjustments to their learning experiences at school. This is evidenced in the number of students accessing the Learning Centre and Student Services. There has been strategic development of the support staff available to both students and staff at Carine which includes a significant increase in school psychology time, the creation of two additional student support officers and the expansion of the Student Support Space in the Learning Centre. In addition, teaching and support staff have indicated an increased concern regarding workload issues and have since benefitted from a range of strategies including providing additional individual planning time for staff on school development days, providing staff wellbeing professional learning opportunities, and increasing the available staff in Student Services to support staff with the management of students with complex needs. Moreover, Carine SHS adopts a family friendly approach to staffing where requests for leave and requests for reduced work fractions are rarely denied. Currently Carine has 25 % of staff on a parttime work fraction.

This strong emphasis on wellbeing is reflected in our last two National School Opinion Surveys conducted in 2021 and 2023. Student wellbeing data has shown consistent trends, with 73% of students feeling safe at school in 2021 and a slight decrease to 61% in the same category; staff perception also improved significantly from 84% to 91% regarding students' safety at school.

During the development of the new business plan in 2021, a commitment was made to ensure that as our staff numbers grew, a staff space be prioritised to ensure a large enough area for collaborative, cross-department meetings and whole school learning. In addition, this new space will provide an opportunity for staff to come together in planned social settings. The development of this new space is currently under way and is expected to be utilised by the beginning of 2025, where our staffing numbers are expected to reach over 280 total staff.

Carine Senior High School boasts a vibrant calendar filled with events dedicated to promoting wellbeing. The highlight of our efforts is Mega-Life Week, a flagship event aimed at fostering a sense of belonging and promoting positive mental health. In 2023, several key initiatives were undertaken:

- Our partnership with Mentally Healthy Schools has expanded through Act Belong Commit, offering a structured approach to enhancing and safeguarding students' mental wellbeing. We provide comprehensive mental health strategies and cultivate supportive environments.
- The central theme for 2023 was the Belong slogan for Mega-Life Week. Teachers

- wore Belong shirts and a Belong mural was commissioned as a constant, permanent visual reminder.
- Banners with our school logo were created and purchased to install at key events and reinforce the message.
- During Mega-Life Week, there was a twopronged approach with activities focusing on emotional engagement and intellectual stimulation. External agencies provided specific useful information to larger groups in lecture format: Y- Safe (cyber safety), BU Standing Strong (bulling/ bystander) and Paraplegic Benefit Fund (to build awareness and understanding). These were contrasted with immersive tactile and aural experiences: petting zoo, circus workshops, magician, hip



- hop music writing, Taiko drumming, sport, break dance, silent disco and art therapy.
- Staff led by example, demonstrating belonging and connectedness through wholeheartedly immersing themselves in activities.
- Success metrics were evident in the overwhelmingly positive feedback received from students. In the 2023 Year 12 Leavers Book, students were asked to recall their favourite memories, and many mentioned the impactful experiences of Mega-Life Week.

This comprehensive approach underscores Carine Senior High School's commitment to



nurturing the holistic wellbeing of our students and fostering a supportive and inclusive school environment. During 2023 the following occurred:

- Growth in our Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC celebrations.
- Rebooking of Paul Dillon for 2023, supported by our Parents & Citizens (P&C) Association.
   Paul provides Drug and Alcohol lectures.
- Planning and works commenced for converting our old gym into a new staffroom, alongside the opening of our new sports hall for student use.
- 3 School Psychologists commenced permanent employment and Student Support Space staffing increased.
- Student Services dedicated Student Support Officer appointed permanently.
- Revision of Colours process for key focus on reward and recognition.
- Dedicated staffing for the Student Support Space.
- Policy development for Wellness Therapy Dogs with 3 now in service at the school.
- Aboriginal Cultural Leader and employment of Aboriginal Student Support Officer.
- Dedicated staff member to develop a Reconciliation Action Plan.
- Professional learning for Executive staff on culturally safe practices to inform development in whole staff.
- Creation of a permanent Level 3 role for Career Leadership to continue our holistic focus on student wellbeing in pathway selection.
- Past and present staff celebrations held including 50th commemorative event, retirement attended by Director General and staff sundowners regularly held.

#### Planned actions for 2024

- Continuation of:
  - o Mega-Life Week with improved planning processes.
  - o Targeted wellbeing seminars hosted by school psychologists
  - o Review of critical incident response frameworks and professional learning
- Further professional learning of cultural capabilities to build staff and student culturally safe practices.
- Completed upgrade of staff facilities.

2. Prioritise whole-school, cross-curricular development of ICT involving functional infrastructure, ongoing support of teacher development and capabilities, and learning opportunities that embed student knowledge and understanding.

#### **ICT Developments:**

The WA Government funded our new building at an investment of \$32 million dollars. Students began to use the facilities at the end of 2023. The complex includes 26 classrooms, encompassing IT labs, home economic kitchens and facilities, new science labs and general learning areas. It has two staff offices, changerooms and brand-new double court sports hall that doubles as an event space, available for both school functions and external hire. A new fitness centre is opening and there are a range of external spaces for students to use which flow into the natural surrounds of the Fred Marsh oval. According to the National School Opinion Survey, both staff and parents have consistently praised the school's upkeep and ongoing enhancements in IT and infrastructure. In 2021, 92% of staff and 88% of parents agreed that the school is well maintained. By 2023, satisfaction remained high, with 84% of staff and 83% of parents still recognising the school's commitment to ongoing maintenance.

These works required significant input from our Information Technology team with additional laptops, wireless infrastructure and classroom technology equipment. Whole-school processes continue to be developed to mitigate damage to technology equipment.

#### R Block – 26 Classrooms, 2 Staff offices, Gymnasium:

- 26x Interactive projectors installed (1 per classroom).
- 32x Laptops per classroom, including 408 new laptops.
- 10x Network switches across 4 levels.
- 37x Wireless Access points installed, providing future-proof wireless connectivity throughout the building.

#### Student/Classroom focused:

- 19x Laptop cabinets deployed around the school.
- 48x New MacBooks for the music program.
- 30x Desktop computers deployed in a technology classroom as replacements.
- 13x Interactive projectors installed across the school in classrooms (9 new, 4 replacement).

#### Staff/Admin/Backend:

- 30x New staff laptops added.
- 10x new staff desktops added.
- 11x Photocopiers replaced.
- 7x Network switches replaced.

#### ICT capability in teaching staff:

Across the business plan, Carine SHS has implemented a targeted approach to utilising ICT in the classroom.











Key teachers across departments were trained in the Microsoft suite and investigated other innovative software solutions. They utilised these learnings in their classrooms and found positive impacts to both the planning of curriculum, but also the delivery and transfer of information to students. This knowledge obtained was then fed back to departments. Ongoing staff training persists in this space and is constantly developing as new innovations arise.

This has increased collaboration of staff, feedback transparency to students, engagement of students and lowered workload for staff whilst developing the ICT skills of students. We have more recently ventured into developing teachers' knowledge of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and how this can be a useful tool in the classroom.

Carine has achieved their ICT targets for a more streamlined response process through the introduction of a ticketing system over 3 years. A 1:1 laptop ratio has been achieved and better WIFI coverage across the school now exists. NAPLAN and OLNA are now fully implemented online and we have continued our commitment to offer professional learning programs targeting IT capabilities in teachers.

#### Planned actions for 2024:

- Continued comprehensive professional learning calendar for staff.
- Improved processes for monitoring and reporting damaged IT equipment.
- Fully operational technology fleet for online testing requirements.
- Move to an online enrolment process from 2025.

# 3. Foster well developed social and emotional skills in students to build resilient, 21st Century, lifelong learners.

Carine has consistently prioritised providing students with a variety of activities and events that foster holistic development. Together with our extensive Student Services team, the Student Support Space, and well-staffed library facilities, Carine presents targeted event weeks and a wide array of extracurricular activities. This ensures students have ample opportunities to engage and enhance their social and emotional skills.

There is a consistent, whole-school focus from the Principal to all staff around expectations of conduct at the school. Staff reinforce these expectations which include litter, mobile phone use, being out of classes, adhering to the uniform policy and being exceptional ambassadors for the school when in the community. Staff survey results show their appreciation for the leadership of these processes with 88% reporting they feel behaviour is well managed, 98% believe teachers expect students to do their best and 89% feel students can approach teachers to talk about their concerns; reflecting the success of our teachers in having high expectations alongside strong relationships. Only 30% of students felt they could talk to teachers about their concerns however this may reflect our model of encouraging students to work with Year Managers when they have concerns, rather than teachers. Positively, 84% of students felt teachers expected them to do their best. To further support embedding positive behaviour the school has a rigorous Attitude, Behaviour and Effort (ABE) reporting process.

To foster well developed students, in 2023 each year group received a targeted program that is age appropriate:



# 4. Strive for academic rigour appropriate to aspirations and abilities of students

#### Progress against priority for 2023:

- 99% of Year 12 Carine Senior High School Students achieved the WACE in 2023. The school's median ATAR continued in the high 80s for 2021, 2022 and 2023.
- We had a record 69 students complete the Certificate IV in Business.
- Carine had the highest performing students in the Course ATAR GEOGRAPHY. Gail Carmody was the teacher of this course. The results are based on the percentage of students at each school who had Year 12 ATAR course combined scores in the top 15 per cent of all students in that course.
- For awards, 7 of our Year 12 students attained a Certificate of Distinction and a further 33 attained a Certificate of Merit based on the Year 12 achievements.
- In 2023, the number of students engaging in a full ATAR pathway was again reduced. This shift is in part a result of the change to university entrance requirements and in part a result of a rigorous course counselling process. Carine provides this course counselling to ensure that students are on appropriate pathways to achieve WACE and successful post-school options, including alternative university entrance.
- Additional pathway to university introduced with students now able to complete a University Preparation Program on the school site (UniPrep). There were 3 Year 11 classes and 2 Year 12 classes. We also introduced the Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies for Year 11 students.
- Consolidation of our FOCUS program; a flexible and slower paced curriculum program that is invitation only.
- Continued comprehensive Activities and Assistance Programs (see Figure 1); a schedule of extracurricular activities designed to provide opportunities related to deeper order thinking such as debating and chess club.
- Review process started for the Quality Teaching Strategy (QTS) which supports improved teaching practices. This Department of Education initiative describes their position on effective teaching and the aspects of school culture to deliver excellence in education network wide.

#### Planned actions for 2024:

- Continued adjustment to pathway processes to allow for change to new senior school metrics.
- A dedicated staff member to lead QTS with a focus on understanding our current strengths, areas for improvement and then planning for professional learning.
- Continued roster of additional optional professional learning for staff including a focus on embedding higher order thinking skills into lesson delivery.
- Education Perfect available to each student to support consolidation and review of key curriculum and skills.

# **5. Engage in innovative, relevant and creative teaching practices** that meet the needs of every student

**Sustainability Initiatives - Food and Textiles** 

Over our Business Plan, sustainability

has been a growth area, where we have now been accredited for 5 years as a Waste Wise School. Angela Hawryluk has integrated sustainable practices into learning areas. Most recently she has supported the Design & Technology team to launch a plastic recycling program with the aim of collecting and reusing plastics in the curriculum. Carine's food classes have been active in maintaining a worm farm, using a kitchen garden, moving to students bringing their own containers for food classes, minimising food waste in cooking classes and participating in the 5000 meals program.

- Our Student Leaders continued to be an important part of our success at Carine Senior High School. Congratulations to Jessica Radford, the successful nominee for the Rotary Youth Exchange Program and recipient of the 2023 School Board Award for her work as Head Prefect with the School Board.
- Quality Teaching Strategy (QTS) launched, staff feedback capturing focus areas of improving culturally responsive pedagogies, embedding higher order thinking practices and consistency in our review and reflect cycles.

#### **National School Opinion data:**

• 2021 National School Opinion Survey data shows that 84% of staff agreed that Carine looks for ways to improve, rising to 90% in the 2023 survey. Our effectiveness was reflected in parent responses with almost 63% of parents reporting that teachers provided useful feedback and that their child's learning needs are being met. This dropped slightly from 2021 with an average response of 67.5% however, the 2023 survey received fewer parent responses. Our diverse offerings are reflected in 64% of students in 2023 agreeing or strongly agreeing that the school gives them opportunities to do interesting things, a slight change from 67% in 2021.

#### **Senior School**

Carine has progressed as expected through our business plan cycle. Our median ATAR has remained in the high 80s and we have taken steps to diversify our pathways, responding to the department's vision of providing a pathway for every student. This is reflected in our new course offerings across the business plan cycle; UniPrep launched in 2023 and Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies. This was alongside a record 69 students completing Certificate IV in Business, as one example of growth in the vocational field.

From 2025, the performance of Year 12 students will be measured against new metrics in line with the Department of Education's 'Every student, every classroom, every day' strategic focus on supporting students to remain at school and unlock and fulfil their learning potential.

The new senior secondary metrics measure the percentage of students reaching aspirational achievement thresholds (such as completion of a Certificate IV or an ATAR score) at the end of Year 12 based on their Year 9 NAPLAN results. Carine Senior High School is well prepared for this transition, offering a range of Vocational Education and Training (VET) certificates, and ATAR and General courses to enable students at all achievement levels to engage with a senior school pathway that addresses their potential, goals and interests.

The senior secondary metrics for WA public schools applies a benchmark of 30% of total students meeting the aspirational achievement threshold. Carine Senior High School exceeded this benchmark in 2023, with 50.6% of students achieving the threshold. This was an improvement on 2022 and greater than the state average as outlined in the table below:

The metrics do not currently include university enabling programs, so it is relevant to note that the measurement does not capture students who successfully completed Edith Cowan University's UniPrep program to gain university admission. In 2023, 29 Year 12 students successfully completed UniPrep.

#### SENIOR SCHOOL RESULTS

The school has implemented various strategies to increase the number of students meeting the threshold including:

- The appointment of Program Coordinator- Careers, Pathways and Transitions in 2023 to implement a whole school approach to pathway planning and careers guidance, with a particular focus on Year 10-12.
- Increased offering of Certificate III options in 2022 and 2023, including a Certificate III in Screen and Media, Certificate III in Sport Aquatics and Recreation, Certificate IV Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies, Certificate III in Visual Arts and Photography, Certificate III in Information Technology and Certificate III in Music.
- An updated course counselling process for Year 10 students making senior school selections inclusive of NAPLAN results, and the move to an online selection process.
- · Targeted support for senior school Gifted and Talented (GaT) students, such as GaT study strategies presentations.
- An updated academic review process, encouraging students in an ATAR pathway to attempt it for at least one full semester prior to considering course changes.
- As the school progresses towards full implementation of the metrics measurement in 2025, we continue to monitor progress and apply strategies to support students, to achieve their academic potential.





#### Post-school destinations - 2022 year 12 cohort




#### **Percentage of VET Qualification Completion**

#### **Understanding the NAPLAN scale:**

Rather than a separate scale for each year level tested (3, 5, 7 and 9), a single common scale makes it easier to see growth over time. The midpoint of each domain scale is set at 500 NAPLAN score points. The mean score will vary depending on the year level and test domain, and from test year to test year.

The table below shows the average student NAPLAN results compared to students with a similar background. This data is found on My Schools. In 2022, Carine Senior High School achieved 'Above' results in Year 9 numeracy. In 2023, we achieved 'Above' results in Year 9 reading, writing and numeracy.

The results across Carine's Business Plan demonstrate our intervention models working over time. We have refined our processes for explicit instruction by specialist teachers to achieve these results.

#### **Attendance & Student Services**

Our 2023 attendance rate 88.1% was well above the average when compared to WA Public Schools 82.5%, however, was slightly behind like schools 89%. 2023 saw our Attendance Rate improve beyond the 2021 and 2022 rate due to a reduction in COVID-19 related absences. This matches the trend across the state; however, we have tracked behind like schools over the three years. We believe this is due to ongoing Covid related absences and our community who takes planned absences during the term for family holidays. This will be a focus area moving forward. In 2023 we expanded our Student Services Team further with the addition of a Student Support Officer and our Psychology Services expanding to a team of 3 Psychologists. We continue to monitor cohort attendance rates and have a tiered approach to ensure appropriate level of interventions are implemented. Our support model of having a dedicated Student Services Manager continues to ensure we have appropriate interventions for attendance concerns.

#### **Planned Actions**

This is an area for improvement. We will continue the above to monitor attendance with a particular focus on students in the 70-90% range. The appointment of a new fulltime SSO has been strategically placed to assist Year Managers with complex attendance cases. We will look at our communication strategies around student absence and our rewards for continuous improved attendance

#### **LOWER SCHOOL**

Carine's 2023 NAPLAN results were acknowledged by the Minister for Education, Tony Buti MLA and in writing by Lisa Rodgers, Director General-Department of Education. The certificate acknowledges Carine's 2023 NAPLAN results in reading, writing and numeracy. Consideration was given to the school's absolute performance, including mean score and the percentage of students achieving Exceeding or Strong proficiency levels, and relative achievement taking into account the school's Index of Community Socio-educational Advantage (ICSEA).

All teachers and students are to be congratulated on these NAPLAN results. Specific focus across the business plan years has been placed on our Numeracy results after a downward trend in 2019. The Mathematics Department made strategic adjustments to their instruction and this was supported through the appointment of a dedicated Academic Performance Manager with specific expertise in Mathematics teaching. Their efforts deserve recognition as the school average of 614 NAPLAN points in Numeracy is 15 above that of similar schools and 46 above all Australian schools.

#### **DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES**

Opportunity for students in our Business Certificates to enrol in the Prodigy Microsoft Certification Program which is an endorsed program – the numbers for endorsed program for 2022 were 61 and in 2023 they were 185. Of these completed Endorsed Programs, Microsoft Certification accounted for 65 in 2023.

We also had success with the program where 7 students were invited to participate in the Microsoft MOS Australian Championship and 2 competed.

There has been an increase in student numbers with Media courses in Digital Technologies. In 2022 we had 2 courses in lowerschool. In 2023 we had 3 in lowerschool and 1 in Upperschool.

Students have the opportunity to engage in real life tasks to prepare them for lifelong skills after school.

In our business certificate courses, students are introduced to a simulated work environment which prepares them for the workforce.

We had an achievement rate of 100% for all students studying a business certificate course that was completed in Year 12.

In our Workplace learning program (ADWPL) 2 students gained employment from their work experience.

#### **DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGIES**

The Design & Technology
Department began recycling plastics
on-site, predominantly plastic lids
collected by the Carine community.
Over 2000 litres of materials were
collected and recycled. This process
involved decontaminating, washing &
sanitising the lids. The lids were then
sorted by type of plastic and colour.
Finally, the lids were shredded using
a machine designed and built on
site.

Research & development continued throughout the year and a purpose built 'pressing oven' was designed and building began. In future this will allow the team to make large flat sheets of plastic to use in materials subjects/courses.

# FINANCIAL SUMMARY - 31 December 2023

We continue to be grateful for the ongoing support from our parent community through the revenue received from voluntary contributions, elective course charges, other optional extras, and donations.

The percentage of revenue collected remained in a healthy position at 83.81%.

With this revenue, the school was able to increase the availability of ICT for students by means of leasing equipment such as computing/laptops, AV/projectors, and photocopiers. Our total annual lease increased from \$991,744.05 in 2022 to \$1,131,118.10 for 2023. With growing student numbers, we expect this to increase in 2024.





# **School Infrastructure Improvements**

2023 marked a transformative year for Carine Senior High School, with substantial enhancements to our campus infrastructure. We completed a significant building upgrade program, notably improving accessibility by integrating ramps and automatic doors across various learning spaces. This advancement has greatly fostered inclusivity, allowing easier access for all students and staff.

Our commitment to creating an inclusive environment was recognized when the Director General acknowledged our nomination for the WA Education Awards in the Inclusivity and Diversity category—a testament to our ongoing dedication to student wellbeing.

Furthermore, we celebrated the inauguration of a new block, funded by a \$32 million investment from the WA Government. This modern facility includes 26 classrooms, featuring a blend of IT rooms, Home Economics rooms, state-of-the-art science laboratories, and general classrooms. It also houses two staff areas, change rooms, and a new indoor sports hall, significantly enhancing our educational and extracurricular offerings.
